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
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## Extraordinary Time

### From the Rector's Desk:

Dear Friends in Christ;

The season of the Church year that follows Pentecost is commonly referred to as Ordinary Time. It varies in length, but it is roughly half the year. One color (green) predominates. If the first half of the year, from Advent through Pentecost, can be said to focus on the earthly ministry of Jesus Christ, his Incarnation, life, Passion and Resurrection, then the second half con-

siders the work of the Holy Spirit in and through the Church. Christ has come, died, and been raised, and the Father has now sent the Spirit to be with us always, to lead us into all truth, to call to mind all that the Lord has taught us, and to do His works in the world. Every day in this season we hear God saying to us, you now have the full tool kit: time to get on the road and bring the Good News to a hurting world.

This timing is completely at odds with the schedule of life in Boston. Here, people wind up in the fall, and wind down in the summer. We're ready to get on the road, all right: the road to Nantucket, the Vineyard, or the White Mountains. For me, this road ends in a particularly comfortable chair on a screened porch in Sugar Hill, New Hamp-

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shire. I listen to the wind in the birches, and hungrily go through the stack of *New Yorker's* I haven't had a chance even to look at all year. I also try to shirk as many chores as possible. I hike the mountains. I pretend to fish. I pray a fair amount, but not on a very regular schedule. And, yes, I read the Bible, actually quite a lot, and (especially this summer) I will once again delve extensively into the works of one of the Bible's smartest readers, Augustine of Hippo (which is surely every child's favorite name for a bishop, don't you think?).

And therein lies the problem, friends. It's this whole Bible thing. Honestly, if it weren't for the Scriptures, I think I could easily spend the next thirty years sitting on that porch. But the movement of the Scriptures is always a movement *outward*; it is a book for the road. The goal of life is not to sit contentedly with a God who (we assume) is contented with us. The goal of life, of the Church, is to move *farther, higher, deeper* into life with Christ, as C.S. Lewis put it. And this only happens by sharing this life actively with others. (Even Christian contemplatives know this, since almost all of them live in community. The genuine hermit is a rare bird in the Church, and categorically different from a minister on vacation who just doesn't want to move from his chair.)

In John's Gospel, after Jesus is raised from the dead, he appears to the disciples and gives them the Holy Spirit, literally breathing into them the life of God. Then he says something truly remarkable: "Whoever's sins you forgive, they are forgiven. Whoever's sins you retain, they are retained." Let me see. If I am hearing this right, it means my job is to find people who need mercy (which means just about everybody), then apply that mercy in the name of Jesus. I can begin, indeed I

must begin with my inner circle, loving my family as Christ has loved me. And, even though I am not very good at this first mission, *at the same time* I have a second mission, to take this mercy on the road, into the world. I can't wait until I am good at the first to get on with the second. I have to do both at once, since that is the only way I will learn how to do either.

So, in June, Betsy and I will be spending a little over two weeks working with Pilgrim in Uganda. Betsy will be helping to lead a trauma conference, and I will be working with Pilgrim staff and the Anglican Diocese of Soroti on joint projects in education, food security, and public health, laying the groundwork for a second Redeemer mission trip sometime in 2011.

Yes, afterwards, I will have some time on the porch, which will be great. We all need time to rest, and that rest can be a holy thing. But I will also be doing a lot of work thinking about the coming year, working on ways that we, as a parish, can move further into the world, showing the mercy of Christ. We need to go farther, higher, deeper in Christ, and in ourselves, in this coming year, helping all of our members draw closer to God, and moving this Good News out into the world to people who have not yet heard it.

I hope you all have a wonderful summer, that you get some good rest, and have marvelous time with your family and friends. And I also hope that you will find ways to take the mercy of Christ with you on the road, and be a blessing to the world. May God grant us all such an abundance of His grace that we find even this ordinary time, from day to day, becoming extraordinary.

## Christian Loving Commitment

Dear Friends,

True Christian Love contains a serious commitment. Commitment is necessary in a love that bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things. Christian love requires a commitment to Christ, a commitment to his church, and a commitment to one another.

That enduring promise to one another can be the hardest part. However, Christ will not let you alone, and this is a good thing. Even in suffering and disappointment, he will be there for us. The Body of Christ, the church, usually does not let us down. A group of Christians together usually makes the right decisions and is usually loving toward one another. Commitment to each other is the hardest part of the Christian life, but also very appealing.

Many of us come to the Redeemer because we have friends who come here and/or our children have friends who worship here, and these are good reasons for the Redeemer to be our home, one of our places of primary commitment.

Yet the Redeemer does not hold a monopoly on the Holy Spirit. There are other churches

around where you can find good music and good preaching. There are other churches nearby that are warm and welcoming. There are many other Anglican/Episcopal churches in the area, and in many cases, other Christian communities which are closer to your house.



This is all true, but nowhere else in the world can you come to a church on Sunday morning and find Dick Tucker, or Maisie Pollard, or John Paoella, or Sarah Allen, or Dick Schmalensee, or Rebecca Reynders, or William Farber, or Samantha Mills, or Ethan Foy. No, you must go to the Redeemer to find them.

This is not just a special place just because they are all here, but, rather, because they are all here to worship God together. We gather together with the joint purpose of worshiping God through Jesus Christ. Through our faithfulness and the grace of God, we have access to the unity, constancy, and peace of God, which we pray for every Sunday.

These gifts of God only come to us through intentional commitment to each other. This committed love is a powerful thing, and it will not be

defeated. We grow as a body when those seeking God come into the church and see a group of committed Christians loving each other. They become inspired by our example and want to learn more about the Redeemer. We are also more likely to ask friends to come to church, when we feel the joy that our loving commitment brings to our lives.

This committed love is not only present in our love for those who come to the Redeemer, but also with our mission partners. This spring and summer we are building on some long-term relationships and mission projects. This month, the Redeemer will send parishioners down to the Gulf Coast for the fifth time since Hurricane Katrina. Most people have forgotten about the plight of the Gulf Coast even as millions of barrels of oil slowly make their way toward the coast, causing even greater devastation to the area. The Redeemer remains committed to the work of rebuilding New Orleans and providing pastoral comfort to the people of that community.

We show equal resolve to continue strengthening our partnership with St. Stephen's in the South End. B-SAFE and the St. Stephen's after-school program have now been going on for many years. I have no doubt that there are hipper, newer projects that we could be involved in, but we remain committed to our partners. Just because the programs at St. Stephens are no longer new does not mean that the

work is done, nor that they do not need partners. St. Stephen's does important work in the South End and in other parts of the city, and they need our committed and continued love.

Our commitment to Pilgrim-Uganda grows every year. Through our mission trip in 2009 and with hopes of a return in 2011, this parish has made far-away friends who enrich our lives. There is no one in this community who is not impressed with the work that is being done to help Ugandans recover from years of civil war, floods, and economic mismanagement.



We are dedicated to our mission partners and projects because we are committed to loving them, and not just in the short term. We follow and believe in this long-term model of commitment because God has showed us the way. God continues to shower steadfast love and pour out his grace upon us so that we might share in that committed love. So let us drink

deeply of this grace and share a loving commitment to the Redeemer, to each other, and to our partners near and abroad.

## Vestry News — Music and Church School at the heart of the Redeemer

*Jesus immediately reached out his hand and took hold of him, and said, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?"*

During the fourth installment of the Vestry Bible study on Christian leadership, Dorsey used the example of Peter's sinking faith to remind the Vestry and all of us that in addition to *knowing* God we must also *trust* him.

On May 11th, Sarah Allen, Church School Director, and Michael Murray, Organist and Choirmaster, provided updates on the Church School and Worship and Music, respectively. In addition, the Vestry heard updates from the clergy on upcoming mission trips, from the Treasurer Dick Tucker on Stewardship and Financial Policy, and from Vestry member Judy Bullitt who reported on the recent Vestry retreat.

### Worship and Music

The Vestry recognized that the Redeemer is blessed to have the talents and dedication of its Organist and Choirmaster Michael Murray. Over his more than seven years at the Redeemer, Michael has used his liturgical sensitivity and musical skill to create traditional worship services that continue to lift the spirits of parishioners. Michael mentioned there are five volunteer members (we are always open to having more) and that the professional members, most of whom are students, are very grateful for the opportunity to be a part of our parish family and that the financial compensation they receive for their time is often an important part of their personal finances.

Michael reported that attendance at Even-song has expanded from 25 to 60 in the past year. The most recent classical concert, organized in part by

Keisuke Wakao and Suzy Westcott, was nearly sold out. The classical concert series has brought many people from the local community into the Redeemer and has made some of Boston's most respected musicians available to a wider audience.

### Church School

Sarah Allen, combined with the work of Children's Choir Director Mary Reynders, brings God and Jesus to life, not only in the lives of the Redeemer children but also in the lives of their parents. The K-7 Church School program has over 170 youth registered, including 14 Youth Assistants who help teachers in the classrooms. There are 25 students in the first grade alone. Each class is taught by 2-4 parent volunteers and ably assisted by the Youth Assistants. As part of Christian formation, the youth participate in

many outreach projects throughout the year, ranging from raising funds for mission trips, to walking to raise money for hunger alleviation, to neighborhood caroling and singing at homes for the elderly.

The Vestry expressed its profound appreciation for the work and dedication of both Sarah and Mary and acknowledged the support provided by clergy, in particular the care and commitment extended by the Reverend Marc Eames.

**Vestry Retreat**

12 members of the Vestry took time on a recent Saturday and attended a spiritual retreat at the Bethany House of Prayer in Arlington. Organized by Judy Bullitt, Mary Crown, and Lucinda Doran Stern, the day was preceded by a dinner at the home of Judy Bullitt.

**Financial Update**

Responses from the follow-up Stewardship mailing have yielded additional pledges for 2010 and further efforts will take place prior to the unofficial closing date



of June 30 for 2010 pledges.

Judy Bullitt and Chuck Farber have agreed to serve as Co-Chairs for the 2011 stewardship campaign, replacing outgoing Co-Chairs Karla Todd and Rick Weed. Karla Todd and Rick Weed very successfully oversaw a Stewardship effort that not only yielded a significant increase over 2009 but brought the Redeemer closer to each other and the *Word*.

**Mission**

Dorsey and Marc reported on their upcoming trips to Uganda and New Orleans. Marc will lead a group from the Redeemer and St. Stephen's to the Gulf Coast this June. Also in June, Dorsey and Betsy will be working with Pilgrim-Uganda in collaboration with the Episcopal Diocese of Uganda on an agricultural initiative, trauma treatment, and planning for future Redeemer mission trips.

## St. Stephen's Episcopal Church —South End

### June 2010 Mission Update



#### Church of the Redeemer St. Stephen's Partnership

For over 10 years, the Church of the Redeemer has had a strong relationship and mission partnership with St. Stephen's Episcopal Church. St Stephen's is a mission church of the Diocese of Massachusetts that is located in the South End of Boston, surrounded by the Villa Victoria housing development. The current vicar, the Reverend Timothy Crellin, was Assistant Rector at the Redeemer from 1996 through 1998. Tim became a priest at St. Stephen's in 1999 to help revive the mission after a period of decline, and under his leadership, the church's average Sunday attendance has grown from 15 to an active 90.

The Redeemer supports both the church and the youth programs with financial grants and gifts. As a mission church and a program serving the poor, St. Stephen's funding sources are limited and our support is critical. The Redeemer Outreach committee has organized several large-scale service projects for St. Stephen's over the last decade, some enjoying participation of more than 50 parishioners. We have held joint youth choir concerts, included St. Stephen's teens in our mission trips, and hosted Christmas and Easter parties. Parishioners have also been very supportive in providing books as Christmas presents to the children in the after-school program.

Individuals from the Redeemer have also been involved in a variety of other ways, from adults who volunteer in the after-school program as tutors and mentors, to the Redeemer teens who volunteer in the summer program. Over the years, Redeemer professionals in a variety of fields have offered advice, helped with projects, and provided access to additional services. For example, parishioners have provided invaluable referrals to foundations, whose grants to St. Stephen's now total about one third of its youth programs funding.

## The B-SAFE Program

St. Stephen's Youth Programs began in September 2000 as an after-school program for 20 neighborhood children, and a summer enrichment program for 15 children. In 2006, at the request of Bishop Shaw and in response to a period of growing street violence in the city, the summer program expanded to serve two additional neighborhoods. From there, the B-SAFE (Bishop's Summer Academic and Fun Enrichment) program has continued to expand and is currently hosted at five urban Episcopal churches and Epiphany Middle School in Dorchester. Today, the B-SAFE Program serves more than 550 children and teens each summer. To learn more about the St. Stephen's Youth Programs and B-SAFE:

## Redeemer Mini-Walk for Hunger



Each year on the first Sunday in May, the Church School at the Church of the Redeemer walks through the neighborhood to raise support and awareness for hunger fighting efforts in our community. Even here in Massachusetts, over a half of a million people struggle to put food on the table.

The Church, through the Rector's and Curate's Discretionary funds, regularly assists local residents in need of food.

Through the Children's Mini-Walk for Hunger we have raised hundreds of bags of food over the years, and it endures as one of our more popular outreach efforts. Over 50 children walked this year on the mini-walk, with some of the older kids taking part in the larger Walk for Hunger downtown. The Walk for Hunger downtown had 42,000 walkers this year and raised \$3.8 million.






